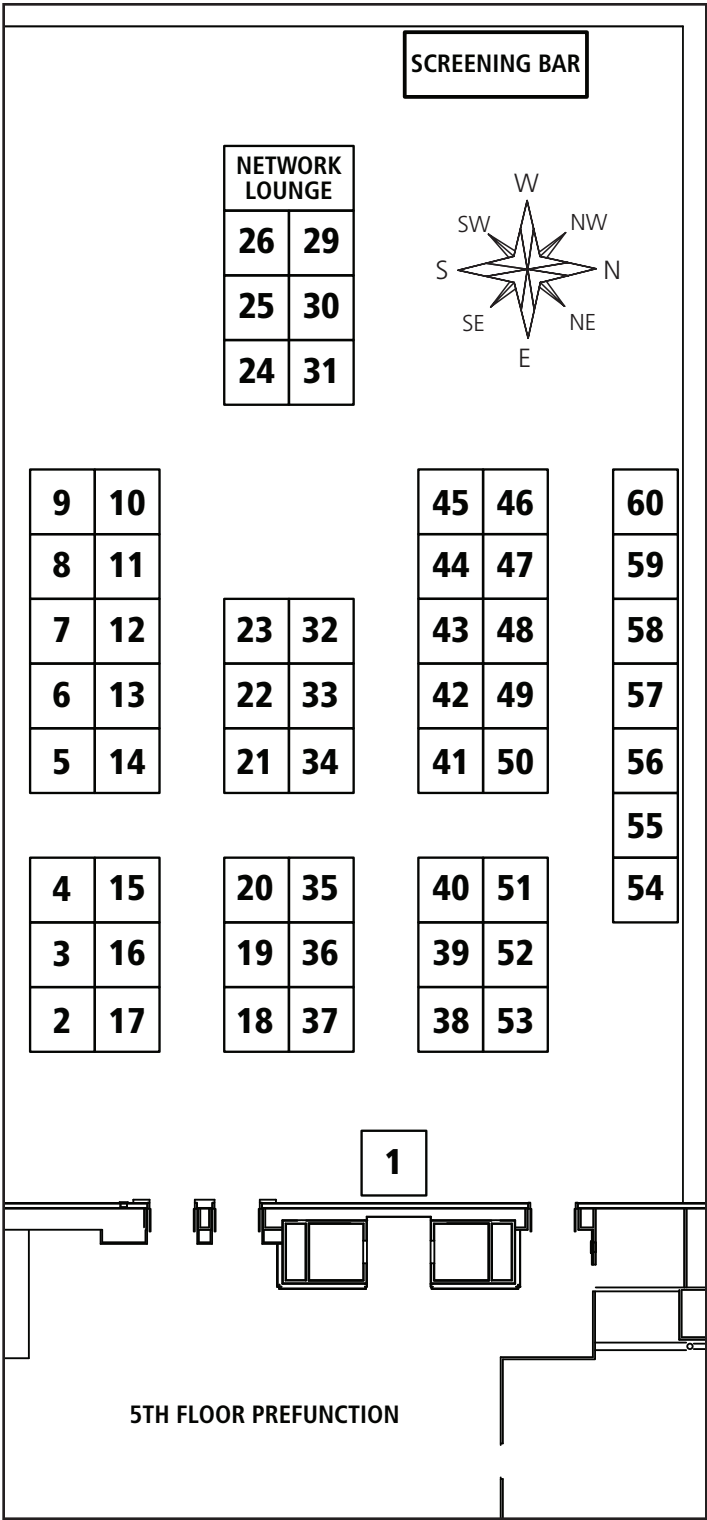

On January 26, 2009, Shaun Donovan was sworn in as the 15th Secretary for Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Through his leadership, HUD helped stabilize the housing market and worked to keep families in their homes. Secretary Donovan previously served as Commissioner of the New York City Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD). Prior to that, he worked in the private sector on financing affordable housing, and was a visiting scholar at New York University. He was also a consultant to the Millennial Housing Commission. Secretary Donovan rejoined HUD after his previous service in the Clinton administration as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Multifamily Housing. He also served as acting FHA Commissioner during the Clinton/Bush presidential transition.

Chef Jeff Henderson is an award-winning chef, motivational speaker, *New York Times* best-selling author and *Food Network* television personality. Jeff grew up on the tough streets of Central LA and San Diego. At 19, he was running a \$35,000 a week drug operation. By 24, Jeff was arrested and during his 10 years in prison, he discovered a passion for cooking and committed himself to turning his life around. He struggled for years, eventually becoming the executive chef of Café Bellagio in Las Vegas. His story was first told in the *New York Times* best-selling memoir, *Cooked: My Journey from the Streets to the Stove*. His follow up book, *The Power of Potential*, was released in 2012.

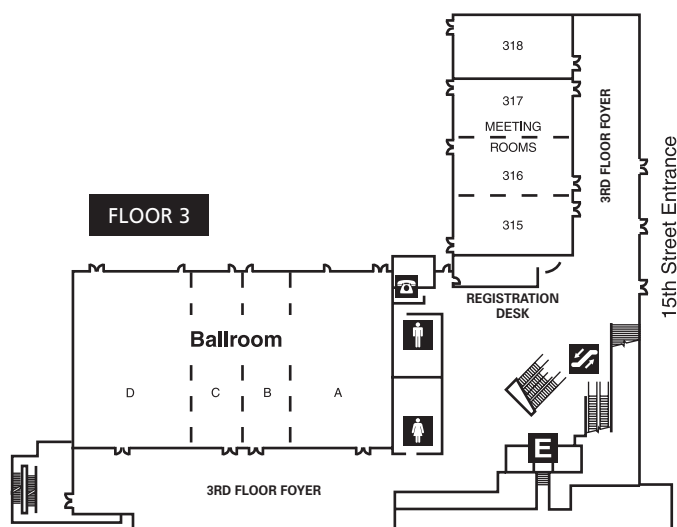
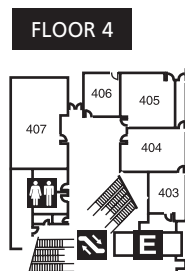
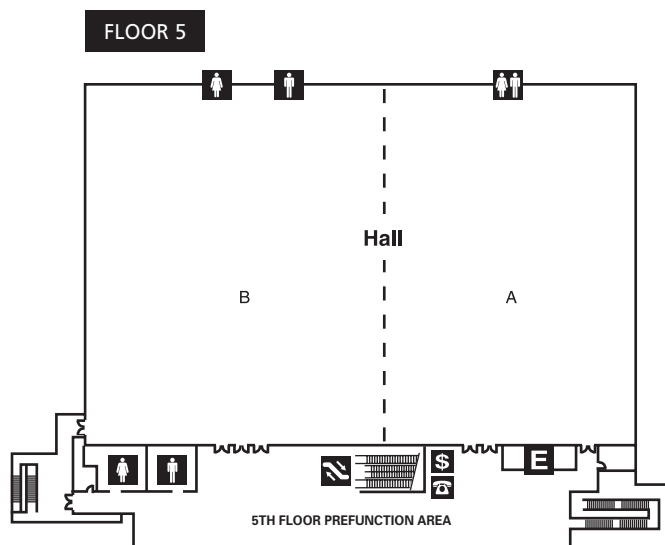
